
I'd like to be happy, really I would. But it's so hard to tell How you shouldn't and should!




I've been thinking about it, There's questions I've had. Like can I be happy even if I act bad?

Any other version is comparatively tacky.






All three of you, you're right

In light of your duty.


Now that's just depressing,

I'm not just a tool.




I think it's time for some different opinions. Maybe others also dislike your dominion.



Suzy, quite right! You sure got them there. Happiness consists of your values, not theirs. Choose to be good, or bad to the bone. As long as you justify the actions on your own.








You're both so confident in personal power.

And you'll once again be blue.


I see what you mean, I know I'd feel guilty

Can solve my plight.




